# Unit Premiere A Mile In Our Shoes

In this unit, your child will begin an inquiry into how stories keep history alive. Your student will use their knowledge of storytelling to create a story about a change in nature. Students will also have the opportunity to gather information about indigenous life through a digital museum tour.



## 1B Instructional Elements

#### Theme-

Our IB curriculum is comprised of six transdisciplinary units that have global significance and offers students the opportunity to explore human experiences.

- <u>How We Express Ourselves</u>- An inquiry into the ways in which we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs and values; the ways in which we reflect on, extend and enjoy our creativity; our appreciation of the aesthetic.

- <u>Inquirers-</u> They are curious and enthusiastic learners who enjoy research and inquiry.

#### <u>Attitudes</u>

Attitudes are expressions of fundamental values, beliefs and feelings about learning, the environment and people.

- <u>Curiosity</u> is wanting to do and learn more.
- <u>Lincoln Curriculum Connection</u>- Learning about the interesting aspects of the Native American culture and beliefs and being able to relate those things in our lives now.
- <u>Creativity</u>— is coming up with your own ideas.
- Lincoln Curriculum ConnectionStudents will create Native American dwellings.

#### Key Concepts

Key Concepts are powerful ideas that have relevance within the subject areas but also transcend them and that students must explore and re-explore in order to develop a coherent, in-depth understanding.

- <u>Causation</u>— The understanding that things do not just happen, that there are causal relationships at work, and that actions have consequences.
- <u>Lincoln Curriculum Connection</u>Students will see the consequences of explorers and migration to new worlds.
- <u>Perspective</u>—The understanding that different perspectives lead to different interpretations, understandings and findings.

<u>Lincoln Curriculum Connection-</u> Students will understand the perspective of Native Americans and their daily life decisions.

### Transdisciplinary Skills

These skills are capabilities that students need to demonstrate to succeed in a changing, challenging world, which may be disciplinary or transdisciplinary in nature.

- <u>Communication skills</u> Listening to directions, others, and information through speaking, reading, writing, viewing, presenting, and other non-verbal forms.
- <u>Lincoln Curriculum Connection</u>— Students will tell their own story using digital tools and share at a Pow Wow.
- Socialskills- You complete a task you have been given. You do your part and take on and share responsibility.
- <u>Lincoln Curriculum Connection</u>— Students will adopt a variety of tribal roles through simultaion.
