IB INSTRUCTIONAL ELEMENTS

Theme-

Six transdisciplinary units that: have global significance and offer students the opportunity to explore the communities of human experience.

<u>Where We Are In Place and Time-</u> An inquiry into orientation in place and time; personal histories; homes and journeys; he relationship between and the interconnectedness of individuals and civilizations from local and global perspectives.

<u>Lincoln Curriculum Connection</u>—Students will learn about prominent historical people who have helped shape our society.

Learner Profile

A set of attributes that, taken as a whole, lay the foundation upon which international-mindedness will develop and flourish

- **Principled:** They act with integrity and honesty, with a strong sense of fairness, justice and respect for the dignity of the individual, groups, and communities. They take responsibility for their own actions and the consequences that accompany them.
 - <u>LCC</u>- Learn responsibility for their own financial actions
- Communicators: They understand and express ideas and information confidently and creatively in more than one language and a variety of modes of communication. They work effectively and willingly to collaborate with others.
 LCC- express ideas creatively.
- Thinkers: They exercise initiative in applying thinking skills critically and creatively to recognize and approach complex problems, and make reasoned, ethical decisions.

<u>LCC</u>- apply thinking skills critically to understand changes within the society.

Attitudes

Expressions of fundamental values, beliefs and feelings about learning, the environment and people.

- Curiosity: Being curious about the nature of learning, about the world, its people and cultures.
- LCC- inquiring about the past and present
- **Independence**: Thinking and acting independently, making their own judgements based on reasoned argument, and being able to defend their judgements.

LCC- making personal judgements and conclusions

Key Concepts

Powerful ideas that have relevance within the subject areas but also transcend them and that students must explore and re-explore in order to develop a coherent, in-depth understanding.

- Change
 — The understanding that change is the process of movement from one state to another. It is universal and inevitable.
 LCC- how has our society changed over time
- Causation

 The understanding that things do not just happen, that there are causal relationships at work, and that actions have consequences.

 <u>LCC</u>- to what extent does a societal change influence one's thinking
- Form— The understanding that everything has a form with recognizable features that can be observed, identified, described, and categorized.

 <u>LCC</u>- rock characteristics

Transdisciplinary Skills

Those capabilities that the students need to demonstrate to succeed in a changing, challenging world, which may be disciplinary or transdisciplinary in nature.

- Communication: Listening to directions, others, and information to speak clearly and express ideas clearly and logically. Reading a variety of sources for information and pleasure.
 <u>LCC:</u> Written and verbal
- Thinking: Gaining specific facts, ideas, and vocabulary. Making use of previously acquired knowledge in practical or new ways. LCC: applying knowledge to explain community changes and effects
- Social: Taking on and completing tasks in an appropriate manner. Working cooperatively in groups, and listening to others.
 LCC: accepting responsibility, cooperating with community
